



1.0 SUMMARY

To consider an application for a variation of a Premises Licence in respect of **Home Bar** and **Restaurant** situated at 16 High Road, Ickenham, UB10 8LJ with representations received from two interested parties, three responsible authorities and nine local residents.

2.0 RECOMMENDATION

2.1 That the Committee agree the officer's recommendation, as set out in Appendix 1.

3.0 APPLICATION

The premises licence variation application has been made by Santi and Santi Uxbridge Ltd represented by Philip Somarakis of Gordon Dadds LLP.

The application has been submitted to add one extra hour for the sale of alcohol and the provision of regulated entertainment to the current opening times on Friday and Saturday nights into the morning following. It also seeks to add a one hour extension to the last entry time to bring it to midnight on Fridays and Saturdays.

3.1 Type of application applied for

Variation of Premises Licence

3.2 <u>Description of the premises</u>

The premise is a newly refurbished pub bar restaurant. It is situated on the junction of the High Road Ickenham and Austin's Lane. The licensed area of the premises is the ground floor with toilets and ancillary offices located on the first floor. There is a large patio area at the front of the building adjoining the High Road and a smaller patio at the side/rear of the building. Both patios have seating with external heating and music available through a speaker system. The premise has an open restaurant and bar area with internal air

conditioning and music. The music is capable of being adjusted in the restaurant area, the main bar and the two outside areas independently.

In addition to the times of operation adjustment the applicant seeks to adjust condition 5 of the current licence. This adjustment pushing back the no entry or re entry times by one hour on Friday and Saturday nights in line with the application.

6.0 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

6.1 Other licensed premises nearby.

There are three licensed Public Houses located in the immediate proximity. The operating times for these for Friday and Saturdays nights are as follows:

7.0 OFFICER'S OBSERVATIONS

7.1 Observations

This is an application to vary the existing licence of an established Public House by one hour on Fridays and Saturday nights. The application is to extend operating hours and the hours for licensable activities.

The premises underwent major changes and refurbishment works in December 2016 following a change of ownership and a period of closure. The new owners chose to obtain a new licence and replace the existing licence when the work had been completed. The current licence was thus granted in March 2017. In the process the application saw representations from the Local Authority Environmental Protection Unit (EPU) who put forward a very full and extensive list of conditions for the prevention of noise. The list of proposed conditions from the EPU was accepted by the applicant and thus was applied to the licence on grant.

At the time of the new application it was fully advertised to all Responsible Authorities and interested parties and no further representations were received. Since the premises have been operating, the Licensing Service has not been made aware of any complaints.

The new premises operators have established the premises as a popular bar and restaurant. The drink prices are generally higher than the three other local Public Houses.

The premise has a main door and a secondary front door both of which are fitted with an inner porch. The distance between the external doors and internal doors is small and it may be the case that both become open at the same time when persons are entering and exiting the building thus allowing internal noise to escape.

The premise has two outside patio areas which have seating. One patio is at the front of the premises where ambient noise is at a greater level. The second (garden patio and outside eating area) is at the side/back of the venue. Music is played in both and regulated to stop at 21.30 in the garden and 22.00 at the front. The external dining garden area (patio) has a condition controlling usage whilst the front patio is not subject to any condition.

The kitchen area of the venue is situated between the bar and some of the nearby dwellings to the rear offering an internal barrier from noise escape.

7.3 Relevant Representations

The relevant representations received mainly raise the following issues:

The Prevention of Public Nuisance -

- Representations received from Local Councillors refer to the closeness of private dwellings to the establishment. The exact extent of this can be seen on the attached plan in **Appendix 8**
- Representations from local residents refer to the premises being a cause for concern with noise escape and noise from persons when the premise is operating and when patrons are leaving.
- Representations from responsible authorities have concerns over last entry times, the control of music and the likelihood of public nuisance.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder -

• Representations received point out some problems with disorder and disturbance particularly when the premises are closing.

8.0 Relevant sections of S.182 Guidance

The Guidance issued by the Secretary of State under S182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states:

Public nuisance

- <u>2.15</u> The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- <u>2.16</u> Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- <u>2.17</u> Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons

are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.

- <u>2.18</u> As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when the powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- <u>2.19</u> Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11pm and 8am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance as customers enter and leave.
- <u>2.20</u> Measures to control light pollution will also require careful thought. Bright lighting outside premises which is considered appropriate to prevent crime and disorder may itself give rise to light pollution for some neighbours. Applicants, licensing authorities and responsible authorities will need to balance these issues.
- <u>2.21</u> Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in anti-social behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

9.0 Relevant sections of the Licensing Policy

Annex A

Clarification added by full Council on 7 September 2017 with respect to ward councillors making representations:

"Where a Ward Councillor makes representations upon an application within their ward, in writing, to the Head of Administrative, Licensing, Technical and Business Services within the appropriate statutory period of consultation for the application, that application shall be submitted to the Licensing Sub-Committee for determination. The Ward Councillor must include in their representations the reasons why they wish the application to be determined by the Sub-Committee."

Licensing Hours

- At 21.1 it states that "Prior to the introduction of the Licensing Act 2003, it was believed that
 fixed and artificially early closing times (established under the Licensing Act 1964) were one
 of the key causes of rapid binge drinking prior to closing times and one of the causes of
 disorder and disturbance when large number of customers were required to leave the
 premises simultaneously".
- At 21.2, "The aim through promotion of the licensing objectives should be to reduce the
 potential for concentrations and achieve a slower dispersal of people from licensed
 premises through flexible opening times".
- At 21.3, "Arbitrary restrictions that would undermine the principle of flexibility will therefore be avoided. The four licensing objectives will be paramount at all times and the Council will always consider the individual merits of each case".
- At 21.5, "Shops, stores and supermarkets licensed to sell alcohol will normally be allowed to
 do so for the full duration of their trading hours. Restrictions may be applied, for example
 where representations are made indicating the particular premises or patrons of the
 premises are linked to disorder and or disturbance".

Licence Conditions

- At 17.1, " Conditions on premises licences and club certificates are determined by:
 - a) The measures put forward on the Operating Schedule
 - b) Mandatory conditions within the Act
 - c) Measures decided at a hearing by the Licensing Sub Committee"
- At 17.2, "Any conditions attached to licences following relevant representations will focus on matters within the control of the Premises Licence Holder or Club Management Committees. They will address matters which have a direct impact on those living, working or engaged in normal activities in the vicinity, as well as patrons of the licensed premises. They will not be used as a means of attempting to attach responsibility to Premises Licence Holders or Club Management Committees for matters outside their reasonable control, such as anti-social behaviour once away from the premises or licensable activity".
- At 17.3, "The Licensing Authority will not impose standard conditions upon every licence issued, however it may have regard to model conditions produced by the Government and/or the Institute of Licensing and it may choose to impose these in appropriate circumstances".

10.0 LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

When considering licence variation applications the Sub-Committee is required carry out its functions with a view to promoting the licensing objectives. The licensing objectives are:

- Prevention of crime and disorder
- Public Safety
- Prevention of public nuisance
- Protection of children from harm

The Sub-Committee must ensure that all licensing decisions have:

A direct relationship to the promotion to the promotion of one or more of the four licensing objectives;

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- regard to the Council's statement of licensing policy;
- regard to the Secretary of State guidance; and
- not be made as a result of a blanket policy which is applied so rigidly that an exercise of discretion in each individual case is precluded

Applications must be considered with regard to the principles of fair process and the Human Rights Act 1998.

When considering an application for the variation of an existing Premises Licence, only the variation is subject to determination. When determining applications to vary an existing Premises Licence, the Sub-Committee must consider all relevant representations that are made before taking such steps (if any) as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps that may be taken are as follows:

- grant the variation as applied for;
- modify the conditions of the licence (conditions are deemed to be modified if they are altered/omitted or new conditions are added); and
- reject whole or part of the application to vary the licence.

Any modification of conditions should be confined to those considered appropriate in respect of the particular variation sought.



Officer's recommendation

To grant the premises licence variation application as follows:

Reasons

The premises is operated by the Santi and Santi group who occupy two other successful premises in Hillingdon. However, running a quiet and un-problematic late night operation with late closing with the dispersal of customers becomes increasingly difficult to achieve the later the licence permits.

Different aspects of a licensed operation affect the level of nuisance and/or disturbance to those who live near to the premises. Some examples of which are the dispersal direction of customers in relation to local housing, the type of clientele, the ambient noise of the area at the time, the provision of parking, the type of music played at the venue, the style of entertainment, age restrictions, dress considerations, door staff, firm management, the list is not exhaustive but each having a part to play on the effects customers leaving can have on local residents.

The premise has been well designed and has become popular. It has not been subject to complaint (as recorded and prior to this application) and the premises have a number of strict controlling conditions over noise control and escape.

The premise has been inspected prior to the hearing and was found not to have completely complied with the conditions that had been attached to the licence on grant. This breach was in part, in the area of sound escape concerning the volume level set of the sound restriction equipment. This breach can be rectified in partnership with the Councils noise officers. Other minor breaches were found and have been identified to the Premises Licence Holder.

In my view I feel that the application should not be granted in its original form at this time. There is evidence that since opening and especially in the summer months the premise has caused some degree of nuisance and disturbance. An extension of the licence would not address that problem but most likely cause it to occur over a longer period of time and with a later end time.

The current closing time for the premises on a Friday and Saturday night is 01:30 and the provision of regulated entertainment and the sale of alcohol is 00:30. This is an unusually long drinking up time, and whilst it could be considered that the premises hours should not be extended there could be a consideration to allow a slightly longer provision for the sale of alcohol, but not the extension of regulated entertainment.

Extending the availability of alcohol by half an hour may allow the customer base to begin to leave over a longer period of time thus lessening the effect of the customers all leaving when bar sales close.

 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:

I am writing to you as the Officer duly authorised to make representations on behalf of the Licensing Authority, in regard to the premises licence variation application submitted on 21st November 2017, for the above premises.

In making this representation, I have had regard to the current licence arrangements, the representations submitted by local residents and also the Councils Statement of Licensing Policy.

The applicant has been operating the premises since January 2017 when the current licence was granted. The applicant also operates licensed premises in Uxbridge. The premises operate well and to the standard expected of licence holders by the Authority.

The licence for Home Bar and Kitchen already authorises licensable activities to 00.30am and closing at 01.30am. Extending these times by one hour is likely to cause disturbance to local residents during the quietest hours of the night.

The Authority is concerned that the introduction of later hours on a permanent basis will introduce a level of nuisance which will have an effect on the well being of neighbouring residents.

Having consideration to the representations already made, it is apparent that many residents accept that there will be a level of disturbance from living so close to a licensed

premises. What is not accepted is 'moving the goalposts' to extend activities and nuisance into the small hours on a permanent basis.

I would therefore urge the Sub-Committee to consider these points when making their determination.

I intend to be present at the hearing to verbally deliver my representation and also to answer any queries from the Licensing Sub-Committee.

I make this representation in relation to the above named premises concerning the application to vary a Premises Licence under the Licensing Act 2003.

I have assessed the application for extending the licensed hours in relation to the licensing objective Public Nuisance in my capacity as a responsible authority representative. I have also had regard to the current premises licence and its associated conditions.

The premises is a detached pub restaurant located on the corner of High Road and Austin's Lane, Ickenham. It has beer gardens located to the front and to the rear of the property and approx 8 car parking spaces at the side of the property, accessed from Austin's Lane.

The nearest residential properties lying adjacent to the pub are 14 High Road and the 25 retirement properties located in Church Place, accessed through Austin's Lane. There are further residential properties located on High Road and also the new development located in Heacham Avenue and Harecroft Lane.

The premises have been operating under the current management and branding for approx 1 year and there have been no complaints made to the ASB & Environment Team, nor have there been any service requests for the Out of Hours Team in response to noise complaints.

I am also aware that there have been a number of Temporary Event Notices which have allowed the continuation of licensable activities to 2am.

However, the extension of live and recorded music to 01.30am on a permanent basis is likely to cause a nuisance to neighbouring properties. The extension of opening hours to 02.30am is also extremely likely to cause nuisance from patrons leaving the premises.

Furthermore, the proposed amendment of the condition relating to last entry time on Friday and Saturday nights, to 12 midnight, will exacerbate nuisance caused by patrons arriving at and entering the premises.

The licence conditions in relation to public nuisance are already extensive and I do not feel that there are additional conditions which could be proposed which would counter the likelihood of nuisance caused to local residents if the hours are extended.

I would therefore invite the Licensing Sub-Committee to consider this representation when making their decision regarding this application.

I have recently been made aware of an application by the above premises to extend their licence hours to 1.30am on Friday and Saturday nights. As residents who live very close to the premises we feel we already tolerate sufficient noise nuisance and disturbance and have no wish to suffer further.

We are already prevented from leaving our bedroom windows open during the late evening because of the disturbance caused by patrons and the noise has increased exponentially with the popularity of the venue. This noise is significantly louder during the summer months, when we especially want to leave our windows open, as more patrons seem to use the gardens at the Bar. I understand that Friday and Saturday nights are generally the days of the week that most people want to socialise later but, for me, these are the nights I need to get better sleep as I work early on Saturday and Sunday mornings. My "understanding" is the reason I have not complained about the noise nuisance before this time, however, I do not want to be kept awake any later.

A further point needs to be addressed. There seems to be insufficient supervision of patrons as they leave the premises. I draw this conclusion because it appears that a large number of those who do leave do so carrying bottles of alcoholic beverages and drinks glasses. Together with neighbours, I regularly conduct a litter pick in the area of land surrounded by railings between our house and the High Road. I am astonished by the number of bottles and glasses that we collect during this pick and can only assume they are discarded by customers leaving Home.

So, to summarise, we strongly object to any licence extension under the grounds of the prevention of crime and disorder and to prevent public nuisance.

It has come to our attention that the Home Public House has applied for an extension to their hours at weekends and we are writing to make a strong objection.

The business is in a residential area, part of which is Church Place, the adjacent development of 25 retirement properties, which we manage. Next door is the old Home Farm farmhouse and next to that is a block of two houses. Across Austins Lane the residential area continues all the way to West Ruislip Station along Ickenham High Road. Our tied accommodation, the Managers' Flat, is above garages and our dining room window overlooks the back of the pub and is less than three metres from the building. We are, therefore, very surprised that the council has not written to inform us of the application.

Home is marketed as a food led establishment, and this was highlighted when the original planning and licence was applied for. As this seemed an improvement on previous incarnations of the pub, and even though its capacity was being increased significantly, we did not object. We understand that Champions, had it's licence revoked owing mainly to the late night music which was constantly complained about and involved the environment team visiting on many occasions. We are extremely concerned that this business may be heading in the same direction. This is emphasised, by the fact that the company has applied for later entry into the establishment when food will have stopped being served. On entertainment nights the music can be heard clearly from our bedroom and even without that, the constant noise from the close by beer garden has been an annoyance, but bearable because it does not carry on too late so far.

The establishment has far too little parking facility for it's size and this will be more the case should the business model veer more toward late night drinking and entertainment as opposed to restaurant trade. Vehicles have already been continually parking on the double yellow lines in Austins Lane, running along the back of our flat. Patrons noisily returning to their cars even later into the early hours will add severely to the disturbance caused.

We trust that you will take all of this into account when considering the application.

 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the

effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

- e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- **4.** The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- **5.** (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licences must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either:-
 - (a) a holographic mark or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- The responsible person must ensure that
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures –
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Minimum Drinks Pricing

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula –

$$P = D + (DxV)$$

Where -

- (i) P is the permitted price
- (ii)D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii)V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - (i) The holder of the premises licence
 - (ii) The designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) The personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from the paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

If the Premises Licence has conditions in respect of Door Supervision except theatres, cinemas, bingo halls and casinos

1. Where a premises licence includes a condition that at specified times one or more individuals must be at the premises to carry out a security activity, each such individual must:

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- (a) be authorised to carry out that activity by a licence granted under the Private Security Industry Act 2001; or
- (b) be entitled to carry out that activity by virtue of section 4 of the Act.
- **2.** But nothing in subsection (1) requires such a condition to be imposed:
- (a) in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films); or
- (b) in respect of premises in relation to:
- (i) any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
- (ii) any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act.
- **3**. For the purposes of this section:
- (a) "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and, which is licensable conduct for the purposes of that Act, (see Section 3(2) of that Act) and
- (b) paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

General

- 1. A sound limiting device shall be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, and shall be attached to all sound amplification equipment used on the premises. The device shall be located in a lockable cabinet and set at a level to the satisfaction of the Environmental Protection Unit (EPU). The keys shall be held by the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) or other authorised manger and shall not be available to any other person. The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement from the EPU. The sound limiting device shall be designed to activate a visual warning and prevent any increase in volume once the pre-determined sound limit has been reached.
- 2. The DPS or his/her representative shall conduct regular assessments of the noise coming from the premises on each occasion there is regulated entertainment, and shall take steps to reduce the level of noise where it is likely to cause a disturbance to local residents. A written record shall be kept in a log book and shall include the time and date of the checks, the person making them and the findings, including any remedial action.
- 3. Obtain a written report from an acoustic engineer who is a member of the Institute of Acoustics. The report should identify the type of regulated entertainment to be carried out and recommend any active or passive measures required to prevent airborne or structural noise and vibration transmission from adversely affecting local residents. A copy of the report shall be provided to the EPU. All recommended works shall be completed to the satisfaction of the EPU within two months from the date of the acoustic engineers report.
- **4.** Customers shall be encouraged to disperse quietly and avoid congregating outside the premises at closing time.
- **5.** There shall be no admission or re-admission to the premises after 23:00 hours, except for customers exiting in order to smoke.
- **6.** The external dining area to the side of the building and the side doors shall only be used up until 21:30.
- **7.** After 23:00 patrons shall not be permitted to take drinks outside, and the smoking area shall be limited to a maximum of 10 persons. The responsibility on this condition will sit with the duty manger, albeit via floor staff or SIA door supervisor/s.
- **8.** Clear and legible notices shall be displayed in a prominent position near the exit doors and within the car park, requesting that customers leave quietly to void disturbing local residents.
- **9.** Clear and legible notices shall be displayed in a prominent position in any external area where customers are permitted to smoke or drink, requesting that they keep noise to a minimum to avoid disturbing local residents.
- **10.** Deliveries and collections shall not be carried out before 08:00 hours or after 22:00 hours.
- 11. All doors and windows to the premises shall be kept closed after 22:00 hours, or at any time when regulated entertainment is taking place. Except for access and egress.
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- 12. After 23:00 access and egress shall be through the main door only.
- **13.** An acoustic lobby shall be installed in the main entrance of the premises to the satisfaction of the EPU.
- **14.** Extract ventilation systems, air conditioning, refrigeration units and compressors shall be properly installed and maintained to avoid causing nuisance to local residents.
- **15.** Intake and extract grilles to ventilation systems shall be provided with suitable silencers to avoid causing nuisance to local residents.
- **16.** A detailed complaints recording system shall be maintained.
- **17.** Any security or other external lighting shall be carefully positioned and oriented to prevent lights shining into nearby residential properties and causing a nuisance.
- **18.** Training procedures shall be provided for managers and staff employed at the premises, with records of date and type of training kept at premises.
- **19.** Closed circuit television (CCTV) system will be fitted, maintained and used at all times. Images will be stored for a minimum of 31 days, and will be available to the Police and Local Authorities at request.
- **20.** The designated premises supervisor (DPS) and duty manager will be members of the local pub watch scheme, if such a scheme exists.
- 21. A zero tolerance to drug use in the venue will be upheld by the DPS.
- **22.** Regular toilet checks shall be conducted.
- **23.** Any patrons found using illegal substances in the venue will be reported to the Police.
