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





1.0 SUMMARY

To consider an application for the grant of a new premises licence in respect of McDonald's Restaurants Limited, Unit 4 Old Dairy Lane, South Ruislip, HA4 0FY. The application form and plan is appended as **Appendix 1** and has attracted 54 representations from interested parties objecting to the application with one representation in support of the application. One representation has been received from the Responsible Authorities, namely the Licensing Authority. A petition against the application has also been received.

3.6 **Operating Schedule and Conditions**

Section 18 of the operating schedule of the application demonstrates the steps the applicant proposes to take to promote the Licensing Objectives, which are as follows:

<u>General</u>

This restaurant understands that in extending our opening hours we have a duty to the local community and that we continue to protect our staff and customers from danger and harm. We believe that the systems we have in place are robust, thorough and will, as far as reasonably practicable, secure the promotion of the four licensing objectives. It should be noted that no McDonald's restaurant within the United Kingdom serves alcohol and further none of our drinks or food are served to customers in glass receptacles.

We are eager to work in partnership with all responsible authorities to ensure the promotion of the four licensing objectives. We also seek to work with the local communities, whom we serve, in achieving a successful cohesion between our business operations and our neighbours.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

This restaurant is keen to work in partnership with the local police service to prevent crime and disorder.

CCTV

McDonald's operates a robust CCTV Policy to ensure compliance with Data Protection Legislation and to assist the Police with the prevention and detection of crime. At all stores where CCTV is in operation appropriate signage reflecting this information is displayed.

McDonald's operate digital motion activated CCTV systems where images are retained on a hard drive system. All CCTV equipment is of a standard suitable to record images of a proper quality, it meets the industry standard and has LGC Forensics or Kalagate Certification. As part of the digital system an alarm will

sound if the equipment is faulty or not recording, thereby alerting management for the need to intervene. The CCTV system is regularly serviced by qualified maintenance technicians.

Access to the CCTV system will be provided to Police Officers at their request where reasonable.

Staffsafe

A Staffsafe system with both audio and visual monitoring capability will be installed in the restaurant, this system, can be activated by either fixed or mobile panic buttons. Once activated the system links the restaurant to an external monitoring centre capable of intervening to resolve crime and disorder issues and/or provide the appropriate advice or instruction to support and protect the restaurant's staff and customers.

At this restaurant all shift managers have safety and security training; including Maybo SIA accredited Conflict Management Training.

Public Safety

This restaurant is keen to work in partnership with the local fire Service and Environmental Health Officer to ensure public safety.

This restaurant has safety systems in place to protect the safety of customers and staff at all times (such as Staffsafe). We work with the local Environmental Health Office and local Fire Service to ensure we are complying, so far as reasonably practicable, with relevant Health and Safety and Fire Safety Legislation. This restaurant is also subject to inspections form our own safety and security teams to ensure our systems are being maintained.

All of our restaurant staff receive comprehensive safety training to ensure that safe working methods are adopted and all staff are trained on the restaurant's evacuation procedure in the event of a fire or other dangerous occurrence.

This store operates a "No Open Alcohol Containers" policy to prevent persons carrying open alcohol into the in-store area.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

Litter

McDonald's were the first company in our sector to introduce litter patrols in the early 1980's. McDonald's is committed to carry out litter patrols collecting both McDonalds packaging and any other litter that has been carelessly discarded. We are happy to act on recommendations from the Environmental Health Officer should they feel that we should extend our patrol to a nearby area, as far as reasonably practicable.

All of McDonald's packaging displays the recycle symbol to encourage our customers to deal with their waste responsibly. Noise

Where it is practical to do so we are content to put measures in place to limit noise. All McDonald's restaurant doors are self-closing and we try to encourage our customers to be considerate to our neighbours and to limit noise both when ordering their food and on leaving the local area.

The Protection of Children from Harm

McDonald's do not anticipate that unaccompanied children will use the restaurant in the extended hour's period covered by this licensing application. We do however take their safety extremely seriously and will

continue to employ the same practices to ensure that are protected from harm at all times when visiting the restaurant.

6.0 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

6.1 Map of the area and photos of the surrounding area are attached as **Appendices 4 and 5**.

7.0 OFFICER'S OBSERVATIONS

7.1 This is an application for a premises licence for a fast-food restaurant selling hot food and nonalcoholic drink for consumption on and off the premises that are seeking to be authorised for the provision of hot food and drink between the hours of 23:00 and 05:00 hours.

The premises is situated in a mixed-use development which comprises retail and leisure premises including Cineworld, Asda and Nando's together with residential properties.

It also adjoins a retail park where Aldi and B&M Home Store are represented.

- 7.2 The representations received mainly raise the following issues:
 - a) The prevention of crime and disorder- The majority of representations refer to the need for a 24hour McDonald's in a residential area given that there is a 24-hour McDonalds's already in operation 2 miles away in Northolt (Target Roundabout) and another McDonald's, albeit not 24 hours, in High Street, Ruislip. "Demand" is not a consideration under the Licensing Act 2003 and demand for another fast-food restaurant/takeaway is a matter for the planning authority and for the market. Please see excerpt below from the Section 182 Home Office guidance at '8.7 The Need for Licensed Premises'.

A significant number of the representations refer to the crime and disorder objective. There are concerns over the operating hours of McDonald's attracting large crowds of young people who may engage in disruptive behaviour thus adding to existing issues in the area e.g., alleged drug use in the children's playgrounds, drug dealing and drug related crime and the use of nitrous oxide cannisters.

One representation cites incidents of crime including cars being broken into, items e.g. patio furniture, clothes etc being stolen from residents private backyards, people attempting to gain unauthorised access to the flats and trying to steal post or items that couriers have left in common areas of the buildings. They are worried that these incidents may increase with non-residents being encouraged to visit the site. This is supported by another representation with CAD numbers for the crimes that they have been the victim of.

Two residents have expressed concerns about the possible threat to lone women living at Arla Place e.g., being followed back to their home.

Another resident raised concerns about feeling intimidated by large groups of people congregating/loitering on the site late at night. The possibility of fights and vandalism have also been raised.

Section182 of the Home Office guidance refers to the Police as being the main source of advice on crime and disorder but the Police have not raised an objection.

b) The prevention of public nuisance - All the representations received from interested parties refer to the public nuisance objective. Concerns are raised regarding anti-social behaviour as a result of the premises attracting large crowds of young people or persons under the influence of alcohol or drugs who may engage in disruptive behaviour e.g., talking loudly, shouting, playing music, ringing doorbells and running away etc and therefore disturb the peace of the neighbourhood.

The noise from the traffic in the area e.g., cars and delivery mopeds is another area of concern for residents in terms of disrupted sleep for themselves and their children, particularly in the summer months when windows are open at night. Noise from late-night patrons and noise from car sound systems and revving engines is also cited.

As the application states indoors and outdoors some residents have expressed concerns about the risk of noise disturbance due to outdoor dining during the hours applied for.

Some residents have raised concerns about parking issues with allegations that they already have problems with non-residents parking their cars in residents private allocated parking spaces. This may be less of a problem during the licensable hours applied for i.e. 23:00 - 05:00 hours when Asda etc will be closed.

Other concerns include problems with people urinating in public and light pollution from neon lights.

There are also concerns about an increase in the volume of litter in the area, which according to residents is already a significant issue, and the associated clean-up costs being passed onto Arla Place residents. Residents are worried that litter will attract pests and result in an unhygienic living environment. In the operating schedule of the application, the applicant refers to undertaking their own litter patrols. The anti-social behaviour team have not objected to this objection.

c) The protection of children from harm – A significant number of representations refer to the protection of children from harm objective. An increased risk of accidents and injuries to children especially in the vicinity of the playground areas of Arla Place where young children are often running around is cited although this may be less of a problem during the licensable hours applied for i.e. 23:00 – 05:00 hours. There are concerns that existing issues in the area e.g., alleged drug use in the children's playgrounds could be exacerbated by the late night opening of the premises.

A couple of representations have referred to healthy eating and the nutritional value of the food on offer.

d) **Public Safety** – A significant number of representations refer to this objective and specifically to concerns that the existing problems residents have with people riding their mopeds through the pedestrianised area of Arla Place and the risk of accidents/injury could be exacerbated by delivery mopeds and scooters.

8.0 RELEVANT SECTIONS OF S.182 GUIDANCE

8.1 Where representations are made

At paragraph 9.3 it states that "Where a representation concerning the licensing objectives is made by a responsible authority about a proposed operating schedule and it is relevant (see paragraphs 9.4 to 9.10), the licensing authority's discretion will be engaged. It will also be engaged if another person makes relevant representations to the licensing authority, which are also not frivolous or vexatious (see paragraphs 9.4 to 9.10). Relevant representations can be made in opposition to or in support of, an application and can be made by any individual, body or business that has grounds to do so.

8.2 Relevant, vexatious and frivolous representations

At paragraph 9.4 it states that "A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives. For example, a representation from a local businessperson about the commercial damage caused by competition from new licensed premises would not be relevant. On the other hand, a representation by a businessperson that nuisance caused by new premises would deter customers from entering the local area, and the steps proposed by the applicant to prevent that nuisance were inadequate, would be relevant. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives. For representations in relation to variations to be relevant, they should be confined to the subject matter of the variation. There is no requirement for a responsible authority or other person to produce a recorded history of problems at premises to support their representations, and in fact this would not be possible for new premises."

At paragraph 9.9 it states that "It is recommended that, in borderline cases, the benefit of the doubt about any aspect of a representation should be given to the person making the representation. The subsequent hearing would then provide an opportunity for the person or body making the representation to amplify and clarify it."

8.3 Determining actions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives

At paragraph 9.42 it states that "Licensing authorities are best placed to determine what actions are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in their areas. All licensing determinations should be considered on a case-by-case basis. They should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be".

At paragraph 9.43 it states that "The authority's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve".

At paragraph 9.44 it states that "Determination of whether an action or step is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives requires an assessment of what action or step would be suitable to achieve that end. While this does not therefore require a licensing authority to decide that no lesser step will achieve the aim, the authority should aim to consider the potential burden that the condition would impose on the premises licence holder (such as the financial burden due to restrictions on licensable activities) as well as the potential benefit in terms of the promotion of the licensing objectives.

However, the Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 informs that it is imperative that the authority ensures that the factors which form the basis of its determination are limited to consideration of the promotion of the objectives and nothing outside those parameters. As with the consideration of licence variations, the licensing authority should consider wider issues such as other conditions already in place to mitigate potential negative impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives and the track record of the business.

Further advice on determining what is appropriate when imposing conditions on a licence or certificate is provided in Chapter 10. The licensing authority is expected to come to its determination based on an assessment of the evidence on both the risks and benefits either for or against making the determination".

8.4 Proportionality

At paragraph 10.2 it states, "Conditions include any limitations or restrictions attached to a licence or certificate and essentially are the steps or actions that the holder of the premises licence or the club premises certificate will be required to take or refrain from taking in relation to the carrying on of licensable activities at the premises in question.

Failure to comply with any condition attached to a licence or certificate is a criminal offence, which on conviction is punishable by an unlimited fine or up to six months' imprisonment. The courts have made clear that it is particularly important that conditions which are imprecise or difficult for a licence holder to observe should be avoided."

At paragraph 10.8 it states, "The licensing authority may not impose any conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives.

In order to promote the crime prevention licensing objective conditions may be included that are aimed at preventing illegal working in licensed premises. This provision also applies to minor variations."

At paragraph 10.10 it states that "The 2003 Act requires that licensing conditions should be tailored to the size, type, location and characteristics and activities taking place at the premises concerned. Conditions should be determined on a case-by-case basis and standardised conditions which ignore these individual aspects should be avoided.

For example, conditions should not be used to implement a general policy in a given area such as the use of CCTV, polycarbonate drinking vessels or identity scanners where they would not be appropriate to the specific premises. Conditions that are considered appropriate for the prevention of illegal working in premises licensed to sell alcohol or late-night refreshment might include requiring a premises licence holder to undertake right to work checks on all staff employed at the licensed premises or requiring that a copy of any document checked as part of a right to work check, either physical or digital (e.g. copy of any document checked or a clear copy of the online right to work check) is retained at the licensed premises. Licensing authorities and other responsible authorities should be alive to the indirect costs that can arise because of conditions.

These could be a deterrent to holding events that are valuable to the community or for the funding of good and important causes. Licensing authorities should therefore ensure that any conditions they impose are only those which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives".

8.5 Hours of Trading

At paragraph 10.13 it states "The Government acknowledges that different licensing strategies may be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in different areas. The 2003 Act gives the licensing authority power to make decisions about the hours during which premises can conduct licensable activities as part of the implementation of its licensing policy statement.

Licensing authorities are best placed to make decisions about appropriate opening hours in their areas based on their local knowledge and in consultation with responsible authorities. However, licensing authorities must always consider each application and must not impose predetermined licensed opening hours, without giving individual consideration to the merits of each application".

At paragraph 10.14 it states "Where there are objections to an application to extend the hours during which licensable activities are to be carried on and the licensing authority determines that this would undermine the licensing objectives, it may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested."

At paragraph 10.15 it states "Shops, stores and supermarkets should normally be free to provide sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises at any times when the retail outlet is open for shopping unless there are good reasons, based on the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours."

8.6 Licensing Hours

At paragraph 14.51 it states "With regard to licensing hours, the Government acknowledges that different licensing approaches may be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in different areas. The

2003 Act gives the licensing authority power to make decisions regarding licensed opening hours as part of the implementation of its licensing policy statement and licensing authorities are best placed to make such decisions based on their local knowledge and in consultation with other responsible authorities. However, licensing authorities must always consider each application and must not impose predetermined licensed opening hours, without giving individual consideration to the merits of each application."

At paragraph 14.52 it states "Statements of licensing policy should set out the licensing authority's approach regarding licensed opening hours and the strategy it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in its area. The statement of licensing policy should emphasise the consideration which will be given to the individual merits of an application. The Government recognises that licensed premises make an important contribution to our local communities and has given councils a range of tools to effectively manage the different pressures that licensed premises can bring. In determining appropriate strategies around licensed opening hours, licensing authorities cannot seek to restrict the activities of licensed premises where it is not appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives to do so."

8.7 The Need for Licensed Premises

At paragraph 14.19 it states: "There can be confusion about the difference between the "need" for premises and the "cumulative impact" of premises on the licensing objectives, for example, on crime and disorder. "Need" concerns the commercial demand for another pub or restaurant or hotel and is a matter for the planning authority and for the market. This is not a matter for a licensing authority in discharging its licensing functions or for its statement of licensing policy."

9.0 RELEVANT SECTIONS OF HILLINGDON'S LICENSING POLICY

9.1 <u>Licensing Objectives – The Prevention of Crime and Disorder</u>

At paragraph 10.1 Licensed premises, especially those offering late night/early morning entertainment, alcohol and refreshment, can be a source of crime and disorder. The Licensing Authority will expect operating schedules to satisfactorily address these issues from the design of the premises through to the daily operation of the business. Applicants are recommended to seek advice from the Police Licensing Officer and Licensing Authority Officers prior to making any application as early advice can alleviate representations being made once an application is submitted. Full contact details for both are contained within the Responsible Authorities contact in appendix B.

At paragraph 10.3 Where a number of premises may be in close proximity it may be difficult to attribute the disorder to patrons of particular premises, however there is a duty on Premises Licence Holders or Club Management Committees to act responsibly to ensure their own customers do not contribute to crime and disorder whilst in their premises and in the vicinity of their premises.

At paragraph 10.6 Applications referred to the Licensing Sub-Committee where relevant representations have been received will be determined on the individual merit of each case. The Licensing Sub-Committee has the power to impose specific conditions when considered appropriate in respect of the Crime and Disorder objective.

9.2 <u>Licensing Objectives – Public Safety</u>

At paragraph 11.5 Applications referred to the Licensing Sub-Committee will be determined on the individual merit of each case. The Licensing Sub-Committee have the power to impose specific conditions when considered necessary in respect of the Public Safety objective.

9.3 Licensing Objectives – The Prevention of Public Nuisance

At paragraph 12.1 Licensing Sub Committees will be mindful that licensed premises, especially those operating late at night and in the early hours of the morning, can cause a range of nuisances impacting on people living, working or sleeping in the vicinity of the premises. When addressing public nuisance the applicant should identify any particular issues that are likely to affect adversely the promotion of the licensing

objective to prevent public nuisance. They should then include in the operating schedule how they will deal with those matters. The concerns mainly relate to noise nuisance from within the premises or from the use of any outside areas, light pollution, smoke and noxious smells. This may also include patrons outside a premises and the dispersal of customers. Due regard will be given to the impact these may have and the Licensing Authority will expect operating schedules to satisfactorily address these issues.

At paragraph 12.7 Applications referred to the Licensing Sub-Committee will be determined on the individual merit of each case. The Licensing Sub-Committee have the power to impose specific conditions when considered necessary in respect of the Prevention of Public Nuisance objective.

9.4 Licensing Objectives – The Protection of Children from Harm

At paragraph 13.7 Applications referred to the Licensing Sub-Committee will be determined on the individual merit of each case. The Licensing Sub-Committee have the power to impose specific conditions when considered necessary in respect of the Protection of Children from Harm objective.

9.5 <u>Representations</u>

At paragraph 17.2 Representations can be made to the Council, as Licensing Authority, by a 'Responsible Authority' or by 'Interested Parties' which include individuals such as residents or bodies such as a residents association, trade associations and other businesses operating. Representations can be made concerning:

- Applications for new premises licences or club premises certificates
- Applications to vary premises licences or club premises certificates
- Personal licence applications on criminal grounds (only by the Police)

At paragraph 17.9 The Licensing Act 2003 also permits Elected Members to make representations on their own behalf as well as on behalf of their constituents. Members of the public who are making representations may also request that their Ward Councillor speaks on their behalf at public hearings to determine applications.

At paragraph 17.11 Written representations include letters and emails. Representations received after the end of the public consultation period cannot legally be accepted and will not be considered by the Licensing Authority.

At paragraph 17.12 Representations must contain;

a) The name, full address & post code, of the person making them;

b) The reasons for their representation;

c) Which of the four Licensing Objectives the representation relates to i.e. Crime and disorder; Public Nuisance; Public safety; Protection of children from harm.

At paragraph 17.14 Representations based on 'Need' for licensed premises, concerns the commercial demand for another pub, restaurant, off licence or hotel. This is not a matter for the licensing authority in discharging its licensing functions. 'Need' is a matter for planning committees and for the market. Representations made on the basis of need are likely to be rejected.

At paragraph 17.15 All valid representations will form part of a committee report that will become a public document. It will be given to the applicant, their agent, responsible authorities, other persons making representations and any other party requesting a copy as well as the Licensing Sub-committee 10 working days prior to the hearing. Anonymous representations will not be accepted.

At paragraph 17.16 Petitions may be submitted as (or as part of) a representation, but may not be as informative as individual correspondence and as such may be given less weight when considered by a Licensing Sub-Committee.

At paragraph 17.17 Petitions will only be accepted if on each sheet it clearly shows:

- The name and address of the application site,
- Reasons for the representation, and
- Which of the four Licensing Objectives are relevant

At paragraph 17.18 Each petitioner must give their name, full address including post code.

At paragraph 17.19 Failure to comply with any of the above requirements could lead to the petition being rejected as a representation.

9.6 Licensing Hours

At paragraph 25.1 Prior to the introduction of the Licensing Act 2003, it was believed that fixed and artificially early closing times (established under the Licensing Act 1964) were one of the key causes of rapid binge drinking prior to closing times and one of the causes of disorder and disturbance when large number of customers were required to leave the premises simultaneously.

At paragraph 25.2 The aim through promotion of the licensing objectives should be to reduce the potential for concentrations and achieve a slower dispersal of people from licensed premises through flexible opening times.

At paragraph 25.3 Arbitrary restrictions that would undermine the principle of flexibility will therefore be avoided. The four licensing objectives will be paramount at all times and the Council will always consider the individual merits of each case.

At paragraph 25.4 In accordance with guidance there is no fixed restriction on terminal hours for any particular areas of the borough. Such a restriction could cause the migration of patrons from one area to another and create the circumstances that the legislation is attempting to avoid. Each application will be dealt with on its merits. It is for the applicants to detail in their Operating Schedule exactly what times they intend to open and close the premises and what measures they will take to ensure that they do not cause nuisance or disturbance to their neighbours in the vicinity. The later the terminal hour applied for, the greater will be the need to address the issues of disturbance and nuisance.

At paragraph 25.5 Shops, stores and supermarkets licensed to sell alcohol will normally be allowed to do so for the full duration of their trading hours. Restrictions may be applied, for example where representations are made indicating the particular premises or patrons of the premises are linked to disorder and or disturbance.

9.7 Licence Conditions

At paragraph 20.1 Conditions on premises licences and club certificates are determined by:

- The measures put forward on the Operating Schedule
- Mandatory conditions within the Act (current list included as Appendix G)
- Measures decided at a hearing by the Licensing Sub Committee

At paragraph 20.2 Conditions attached to licences by the Licensing Authority that have been proposed by the applicant in their operating schedule should be consistent with the steps set out in the operating schedule. This means that the effect of these conditions should be substantially the same as that intended by the terms of the operating schedule.

At paragraph 20.3 Any conditions attached to licences following relevant representations will focus on matters within the control of the Premises Licence Holder or Club Management Committees. They will address matters which have a direct impact on those living, working or engaged in normal activities in the vicinity, as well as patrons of the licensed premises.

They will not be used as a means of attempting to attach responsibility to Premises Licence Holders or Club Management Committees for matters outside their reasonable control, such as anti-social behaviour once away from the premises or licensable activity. Conditions imposed by the Licensing Authority shall be appropriate, reasonable, and proportionate and should be determined on a case-by-case basis.

At paragraph 20.4 The Licensing Authority will not impose standard conditions upon every licence issued, however it may have regard to model conditions produced by the Government and/or the Institute of Licensing and it may choose to impose these in appropriate circumstances.

10. 00 RELEVANT SECTIONS OF HILLINGDON'S PETITION SCHEME (FROM JULY 2022)

On page 4 Electronic Petitions: ... it is recognised that other online electronic petition facilities are available and the Council is happy to accept these where it can be identified that the people signing the petition live in the Borough.

On page 9 Licensing Petitions: Such petitions would be on matters, for example, in relation to street trading, entertainment, alcohol or premises related licensing, sex establishments, scrap metal or gambling. In such cases, petitions may only be submitted to the Licensing Authority or Licensing Team as relevant representations and, if applicable, during any statutory consultation period on the matter. The lead petitioner/applicant (or their nominated representative) will then have the opportunity to address a Licensing Sub-Committee on the matter as set out in the relevant hearing protocol or legislation. The Council will advise the lead petitioner further on this different process upon receipt of such a petition.

11.0 LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

- 11.1 When considering an application for a grant of a new Premises Licence, the Sub-Committee shall carry out its functions with a view to taking steps it considers appropriate for promoting the licensing objectives. The licensing objectives are:
 - Prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public Safety
 - Prevention of public nuisance
 - Protection of children from harm
- 11.2 Members should note that each objective is of equal importance. There are no other licencing objectives and the four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.
- 11. 3 An application for a new premises licence may be made pursuant to s.16 and s.17 of the Act, and with regard to the Licensing Act 2003 (Premises licences and club premises certificates) Regulations 2005/42 and the licensing Act 2003 (Fees) Regulations 2005/79.
- 11.4 The Sub-Committee must ensure that all licensing decisions:
 - Have a direct relationship to the promotion of one or more of the four licensing objectives
 - Have regard to the Council's statement of licensing policy
 - Have regard to the Secretary of State guidance
 - Must not be subject to a blanket policy to the extent that it is applied so rigidly that an exercise of discretion in each individual case is precluded
- 11.5 Where relevant representations are made, the Licensing Authority must hold a hearing to determine the application, unless all are agreed that such a hearing is unnecessary s.18(3)(a) Licencing Act 2003.
- 11.6 Relevant representations are those that relate to the effect of the granting of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives made by an interested party or responsible authority that have

not been withdrawn and are not, in the opinion of the relevant licencing authority, frivolous or vexatious s.18(7) Licensing Act 2003.

- 11.7 The Sub-Committee can only consider matters within the application that have been raised through representations from interested parties and responsible authorities. Interested parties must live within the vicinity of the premises. All applications will be decided on a case-by-case basis.
- 11.8 Following a hearing, the Sub-Committee must consider all relevant representations, and having taken into account the promotion of the licensing objectives, under s.18(3(b) and (4) Licensing Act 2003, a decision can be taken:
 - i. To grant the licence, subject to the mandatory conditions and conditions consistent with the operating schedule;
 - ii. To impose additional relevant conditions to such an extent as is considered necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
 - iii. To exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - iv. To amend the times for all or some of the licensable activities;
 - v. To refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
 - vi. To reject the application.
- 11.9 Conditions will not be necessary if they duplicate a current statutory requirement. The licencing Authority may therefore only impose such conditions that are necessary to promote the licensing objectives arising out of the consideration of the representations.
- 11.10 If the Sub-Committee determines that it is necessary to modify the conditions, or to refuse the application for a Premises Licence application, it must give reasons for its decision.
- 11.11 The Council in its capacity as Licensing Authority has a duty to have regard to its public sector equality duty under s.149 of the Equality Act 2010. In summary s.149 provides that a Public Authority must, in the exercise of its functions, have due regard to the need to:
 - i. Eliminate discrimination harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under this Act;
 - ii. Advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it; and
 - iii. Foster good relations between persons who share relevant protected characteristics and persons who do not.
- 11.12 Section 149(7) of the Equality Act 2010 defines nine relevant protected characteristics these are:
 - i. age
 - ii. gender reassignment
 - iii. being married or in a civil partnership
 - iv. being pregnant or on maternity leave
 - v. disability
 - vi. race including colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin
 - vii. religion or belief
 - viii. sex
 - ix. sexual orientation
- 11.13 Officers have provided the Sub-Committee with recommendations related to this application. Subject to the above-mentioned factors having been properly considered, the Sub-Committee may depart from the recommendations if there are good reasons for doing so. The Sub-Committee is advised that such departures could give rise to an appeal or judicial review.
- 11.14 Interested parties, Responsible Authorities and the Applicant have the right to appeal the decision of the Licensing Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court within a period of 21 days beginning with the

day on which the applicant was notified by the Licensing Authority of the decision to be appealed against.

This restaurant understands that in extending our opening hours we have a duty to the local community and that we continue to protect our staff and customers from danger and harm. We believe that the systems we have in place are robust, thorough and will, as far as reasonably practicable, secure the promotion of the four licensing objectives. It should be noted that no McDonald's restaurant within the United Kingdom serves alcohol and further none of our drinks or food are served to customers in glass receptacles.

We are eager to work in partnership with all responsible authorities to ensure the promotion of the four licensing objectives. We also seek to work with the local communities, whom we serve, in achieving a successful cohesion between our business operations and our neighbours.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

This restaurant is keen to work in partnership with the local police service to prevent crime and disorder.

CCTV

McDonald's operates a robust CCTV Policy to ensure compliance with Data Protection Legislation and to assist the Police with the prevention and detection of crime. At all stores where CCTV is in operation appropriate signage reflecting this information is displayed.

McDonald's operate digital motion activated CCTV systems where images are retained on a hard drive system. All CCTV equipment is of a standard suitable to record images of a proper quality, it meets the industry standard and has LGC Forensics or Kalagate Certification. As part of the digital system an alarm will sound if the equipment is faulty or not recording, thereby alerting management for the need to intervene. The CCTV system is regularly serviced by qualified maintenance technicians.

Access to the CCTV system will be provided to Police Officers at their request where reasonable.

Staffsafe

A Staffsafe™ system with both audio and visual monitoring capability will be installed in the restaurant, this system, can be activated by either fixed or mobile panic buttons. Once a tagge able system links the restaurant to an external monitoring

centre capable of intervening to resolve crime and disorder issues and/or provide the appropriate advice or instruction to support and protect the restaurant's staff and customers.

At this restaurant all shift managers have safety and security training; including Maybo SIA accredited Conflict Management Training.

c) Public safety

This restaurant is keen to work in partnership with the local Fire Service and Environmental Health Officer to ensure public safety.

This restaurant has safety systems in place to protect the safety of customers and staff at all times (such as Staffsafe). We work with the local Environmental Health Office and local Fire Service to ensure we are complying, as far as reasonably practicable, with relevant Health and Safety and Fire Safety Legislation. This restaurant is also subject to inspections from our own safety and security teams to ensure our systems are being maintained.

All of our restaurant staff receive comprehensive safety training to ensure that safe working methods are adopted and all staff are trained on the restaurant's evacuation procedure in the event of a fire or other dangerous occurrence.

This store operates a "No Open Alcohol Containers" policy to prevent persons carrying open alcohol into the in-store area.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

Litter

McDonald's were the first company in our sector to introduce litter patrols in the early 1980's. McDonald's is committed to carry out litter patrols collecting both McDonald's packaging and any other litter that has been carelessly discarded. We are happy to act on recommendations from the Environmental Health Officer should they feel that we should extend our patrol to a nearby area, as far as this is reasonably practicable.

All of McDonald's packaging displays the recycle symbol to encourage our customers to deal with their waste responsibly. Further details regarding McDonald's commitment to reducing waste and litter nuisance can be found at the "Our World" section of the McDonald's website:

Noise

Where it is practical to do so we are content to put measures in place to limit noise. All McDonald's restaurant doors are self-closing and we try to encourage our customers to be considerate to our neighbours and to limit noise both when ordering their food and on leaving the local area.

e) The protection of children from harm

McDonald's do not anticipate that unaccompanied children will use the restaurant in the extended hour's period covered by this licensing application. We do however take their safety extremely seriously and will continue to employ the same practices to ensure that they are protected from harm at all times when visiting the restaurant.

- A **current** Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,



I am writing to you as the Officer duly authorised to make representations on behalf of the Licensing Authority, in relation to the application for a new premises licence submitted by McDonald's Restaurants Limited.

The application proposes the provision of late night refreshment from 23:00 hours to 05:00 hours Monday to Sunday.

The Licensing Authority wishes to make a representation against this application based on the following licensing objectives:

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder Public Safety The Prevention of Public Nuisance The Protection of Children from Harm

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

In Section 18(b) of their operating schedule, the applicant makes reference to their CCTV system and policy. However we would like to see more specific measures in regards to this and would advise relevant conditions, such as;

 "The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system. The CCTV shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 31 days with date and time stamping. Viewing of recordings shall be made available immediately upon request of Police or authorised officer throughout the entire 31 day period."

This staff member must be able to provide the Police or authorised council officer copies of recent CCTV images or data with the absolute minimum of delay when requested.

In addition, we would also expect a good operator trading at these proposed times to keep an incident log book and record certain situations so that the relevant authorities can have confidence that Management are taking the appropriate action. We would suggest the following condition:

3. An incident log shall be kept at the premises and made available on request to an authorised officer of the Council or the Police. It will record the following: (a) all crimes reported to the venue (b) any complaints received concerning crime and disorder (c) any incidents of disorder (d) any faults in the CCTV system, (e) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

Public Safety

We note the measures that the applicant has put forward at 18c of their operating schedule but we would in addition suggest the following condition:

4. The means of escape provided for the premises shall be maintained unobstructed, free of trip hazards, be immediately available and clearly identified in accordance with the plans provided.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

In relation to litter, the applicant has stated at 18(d) of their operating schedule that they are, "committed to carry out litter patrols", however we would like to know the specific measures they would be taking. For example, details about the frequency of these litter patrols, what areas they would cover and whether these patrols are recorded and documented. We would expect there to be an appropriate number of external litter bins to be provided and for relevant signage to be displayed in prominent positions asking for customers to respect the needs of local residents.

The application is silent on waste collections and stock deliveries at the premises and we would advise for the applicant to detail specific measures so these take place at appropriate times.

We have concerns about the proposed operating times for late night refreshment. We feel there is the risk of potential disturbance to residents living nearby. Earlier finishing times may wish to be considered by the applicant so they are more appropriate for the local area. The applicants have stated that late night refreshment will be for both "indoors" and "outdoors". More clarity is required from the applicant at this stage as any disturbance may take the form of vehicle noise of customers arriving, waiting and leaving the premises. In addition, people noise from groups of customers late at night or in the early hours of the morning could similarly disturb residents. Furthermore, there is no mention as to whether the applicant will use delivery services such as Deliveroo or Uber Eats. If this is the case, then we would expect the applicant to detail measures that look at preventing any disturbance arising from this.

The Protection from Children from Harm

In section 18e of their operating schedule, the applicants have stated that they do not anticipate that unaccompanied children will use the restaurant during the licensable times and comment that they "will continue to employ the same practices to ensure that they are protected from harm at all times when visiting the restaurant". Again, it would be helpful for the applicant to detail these specific measures or practices so these can be formally considered as possible conditions.

I am happy to attend a hearing, if required, to verbally deliver my representation and also to answer any queries from the Licensing Sub-Committee.



Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing this email to express my strong opposition to the proposed application for a premises license by McDonald's Restaurant at Unit 4, Old Dairy Lane in South Ruislip. I am a homeowner of an apartment within Arla Place and I live diagonally opposite Unit 4. As a concerned resident of Arla Place, I firmly believe that granting this license to McDonald's Restaurant which would also operate from 2300 hours to 5 am would have a very severe negative impact on our community which consists of babies, young children, peaceful adults and elderly. Within my email, I will elaborate some of my very serious concerns if McDonald's Restaurant is established.

1. Nuisance:

• The operation of McDonald's Restaurant will result in increased flow of people who would pass across Arla Place. As Arla Place is a pedestrian estate, more people would cross across our estate. We are already facing a lot of inconvenience due to people visiting the other establishments within Old Dairy especially for the litter they make. Often people leave food waste, take away boxes and empty bottles throughout our estate. At times, the residents have noticed that the garbage bins in front of ASDA are full and the litter lies around the bins which stinks making it difficult to pass through. Arla Place is a private development operated by Trinity Estates. With this, the Council has no responsibility for the upkeep of the estate; this is Trinity's remit where residents pay an annual service charge for cleaning, etc. Should the McDonald's Restaurant open, residents will have to pay more service charge for more routine cleaning of the estate from all the additional litter made by takeout from McDonald's Restaurant (wrappers, half eaten food, cups, etc.).

• We are already facing a lot of nuisance due to increased noise levels from the people who pass through our estate and McDonald's Restaurant will just add to it. There will be an increased footfall of teenagers who will pass through our estate, making more noise (perhaps just by talking, shouting or by playing music on loud speakers which we are anyway facing currently).

• Within our estate we have a park for kids and we have often seen it being used by teenagers for smoking (unauthorised substances) and eating. They leave litter behind which is again cleaned by Trinity at our cost. Having

McDonald's there, would also increase the litter within that area which will subsequently affect the service charges that we currently pay.

- 2. Safety of resident's and their belongings:
 - Having McDonald's will only increase the visitors to loiter around the estate which is not for public use for example our backyards and our private car parks. We already have an issue with non-residents/people loitering around these areas creating nuisance. There also have been incidents where, such groups of people have broken into the cars, or robbed items that are placed in private backyards for example patio furniture, clothes, etc. Can McDonald's take the responsibility for the theft of items because of its visitors?

• We are already facing issues with people trying to enter the buildings without any authority and have tried to steal our posts or couriers which are left inside the buildings. Having McDonald's will only increase such unauthorised visitors adding up to theft.

• Often teenagers passing by have caused a lot of nuisance by ringing the doorbells and running away. Again, having McDonald's will only increase such occurrences.

3. Health and Safety:

• It is evident that a lot of people who pass-by usually later in the evening especially on the weekends use the area right opposite Cobalt Court, 28 Arla Place to urinate. I myself have written to Trinity a couple of times to plant more bushes which can prevent people from entering the corner-area to urinate. This is an absolutely disgusting state and is very unhealthy for the residents. Having McDonald's will also increase this regardless of having toilet facilities within the Restaurant. I am very certain especially on this point because there are toilets in ASDA, Cineworld, Nando's and the Gym yet people urinate in our estate. This is very unhealthy and can cause diseases.

• It is also very evident that a lot of fights happen between teenagers or others outside McDonald's. I myself have seen it happen in front of McDonald's in various locations multiple times in London, Greater London and also across the UK. We are a peaceful community and we do not want outsiders to come into our spaces and have physical fights and having McDonald's will only increase this.

4. Increased traffic:

• Having McDonald's will only increase the take-away service provided by companies such as Deliveroo, Uber Eats, Just Eat, etc. to park their vehicles in our estate. The most convenient way for them to get to the estate especially on their two wheeler is through our estate, they will park their vehicles in our estate which is private for parking. NO outsider parking is

allowed. We are anyway facing an issue for non-residents to park their cars within our private allocated parking spots and having a McDonald's will only increase this issue. It is very inconvenient especially when you are returning late at night with a baby and then you see an unauthorised car being parked at your spot- it gives a lot of stress for parents and it increases the risk of having a parking ticket for us as we are not able to park in our allocated spot.

Moreover, the introduction of a McDonald's will alter the aesthetic appeal of our area with bright signage, excessive lighting diminishing the residential character that attracted many of us to this community. It is essential for the local authority to prioritise the well-being and satisfaction of the residents prior to economic welfare. Granting a premises license to McDonald's without considering our concerns demonstrates a lack of regard for our legitimate worries and neglects the Council's duty to protect our interest.

For all the reasons that I have elaborated above, I humble request you to deny the proposed premises license for McDonald's Restaurant and explore alternate locations that are more suitable for such commercial establishments, sparing our neighbourhood from disturbance and inconvenience. Kindly keep me informed of any development or hearings regarding this matter as I am eager to participate and present my views in person.

Thank you for giving me an opportunity to express my views and for paying attention to my concerns.

Extended operating hours could attract individuals who may engage in anti-social behavior, littering, or disturbances. PUBLIC SAFETY

Furthermore, insufficient evidence has been provided to clarify the parking impacts of the proposals due to the failure to provide a parking accumulation study and evidence of residual parking capacities. As the location exhibits vehicular and foot traffic at present which would be exacerbated by the proposal, there is the significant concern that the proposals will result in highway and pedestrian safety problems. The proposal is therefore contrary to policies AM7 and AM14 of the Hillingdon Local Plan: Part Two Saved UDP Policies (November 2012).

Already the car park of Old Dairy Lane is overflowing during evening & weekends. Specially with no site attendant leaving the whole premises waiting for fatal accident or human conflict. Already drivers are often arguing with each other in frustration on not being able to park during busy hours.

500 cars in car park of Old Dairy, left unattended is crucial for public safety.

The increased vehicular foot traffic close to the residential block will ultimately harm the air quality & will increase air pollution.

Such set-up is very hazard for any Disable resident in Arla Place.

Also the site is falls under Air Quality Management Area (AQMA) of Hillingdon due to poos air quality.

McDonald opening at Old Dairy will clearly violate, Human Rights Act (1998) (HRA 1998) which makes it unlawful for the Council to act incompatibly with Convention rights, specifically Article 6 (right to a fair hearing); Article 8 (right to respect for private and family life); Article 1 of the First Protocol (protection of property).

GUIDANCE NOTES THE IMPORTANCE OF THE INCIDENT DIARY

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR is an activity, which is un-neighbourly and causes a nuisance to those nearby.

Many neighbour disputes can be sorted out by talking calmly with the other person. Hillingdon Homes want to take action quickly if this approach fails, or someone's behaviour is very anti social. We can only really take action against those who cause anti social behaviour if we have evidence.

YOU CAN HELP by keeping a diary of everything that happens. We can solve most disputes without taking legal action but if the situation is bad enough we will use all the means available including taking legal action. The incident diary is useful evidence but if we take legal action we need a carefully written down description of every incident. A court will only accept this incident diary if it is written in a certain way. **Please make sure you keep to these four simple rules.**

How to keep the diary

1. The diary is **your own** personal record of what you see or hear. You cannot write down something that other people (including your wife or husband or partner) have witnessed. **They must record it in their own diary**.

2. You must fill in the diary **as soon as possible** while the incident is fresh in you mind. Do it on the same day if you can. If you leave it much longer it may not be acceptable evidence.

3. Fill in one diary sheet for each separate incident (there are 2 sides to each diary and 5 diaries per booklet). If there is a second incident on the same day or night, start a new sheet. Put your signature and date at the bottom of each sheet.

4. Write down everything you see and hear in as much detail as possible. A general summary will not be taken as seriously by the court as word for word evidence. So you will have to include swear words where they are used. You will see in the example sheet (which shows you how to fill in the diary) that swear words have been written in full. This is much more effective than 'he used abusive language'. We apologise if you find this upsetting but if we do have to take legal action and go to court you will have to do the same in court to support your evidence.

Other Evidence

It is a good idea to collect other evidence to back up the diary. Photographs can help in some cases – car repair, overgrown gardens, graffiti etc. Describe the location and put the date and time the photo was taken on the back and sign it. You could make a tape recording of very loud music or shouting and again you would need to describe the location and put the date and time and your signature on a label on the tape.

Speak to your Housing Officer or Anti-Social Behaviour Officer if you need help. Thank you for your co-operation.


Notes:

- 1) All representations must be submitted before the conclusion of the 28 day consultation period. This will be advertised on the public notices and also on the Councils website.
- 2) Persons who may make representation include; persons who reside near to the premises to which the application relates and who are likely to be affected by licensable activities; residents associations who are representing residents who reside near to the application premises; Ward Councillors representing their constituents; any person who lives or works in the area and has concerns about the application premises.
- 3) Please note that representations cannot be anonymous. Copies of all representations will be published in any Committee papers and will be sent to all persons involved with the hearing including the applicant. If you have concerns about the use of your information and would like to discuss this further, please contact one of our Licensing Officers for a discussion, on the contact details below.
- 4) In order to be considered 'relevant', the representation must relate to one or more of the 'Licensing Objectives'. These objectives are;
 - a) Prevention of Crime/Disorder This relates to any criminal activity, disorder or anti-social behaviour related to the application premises.
 - b) Prevention of Public Nuisance This relates to noise nuisance and vibration, litter, noxious smells, light pollution.
 - c) Protection of Children from harm This relates to the protection of children whilst on the application premises.
 - d) Public Safety This relates to the physical condition of the premises and the safety features provided for members of the public such as; fire safety, health & safety.
- 5) Upon submitting a representation, it is expected that you will attend the Licensing Sub-Committee hearing to deliver your representation verbally and answer any queries that the Committee may have. If you are unable to attend, your written representation will be considered.
- 6) You may wish to suggest an outcome to the Licensing Sub-Committee ie. grant the application with extra conditions; grant the application with fewer hours/activities; reject the application.
