ESFA allocation for outside London <i>annual</i>	£60,217	As above but also includes £20k for learners who began a qualification in 18-19 but will not finish it until 19-20.
Adult Learning Loans Adult Learning Loans <i>annual</i> Bursary	£56,814 £3,630	Similar to university student loans, these are available at low interest rates for adults over 19 to pay fees for courses at level 3 and above. Not means tested. Repaid at source when earnings reach £21k.
Local Authority income <i>annual</i>	£20,000	The LA provides funding the service every year to subsidise course fees for Hillingdon residents.
