HEADLINES

The purpose of this report is to provide the Families, Health and Wellbeing Select Committee with an update on school places planning, including a summary of the Year 7 offers for September 2022. All resident pupils were offered a place. The pattern of movement around and beyond the Borough is shown.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

Primary rolls are still experiencing some movement, as across London. The January 2022 census analysis is not yet completed. The Reception and Junior National Offer Day is over Easter and will be reported later. The Pan-London computer has begun matching parent preferences received to the places available and it appears the majority of parents will be offered their top preference. Around half of primary schools continue to be full and many of the others have some empty places in classes, but a few face a greater decline in rolls and in the September 2022 intake. Officers have begun analysis and are prepared to support the schools and help mitigate the financial and educational challenges. More detail on this strategy to ensure all schools are successful, sustainable, and viable will be brought to the Committee.

Demand is still rising for specialist places for some pupils with EHCPs. Plans and delivery are underway to expand special schools and now a further programme of new places has been prepared as a key part of the Council's DSG Recovery Programme, and a bid for further capital has been submitted to the DfE.

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Secondary National Offer Day 1 March 2022

- 1. There had been a rise in the total number of applications both from Hillingdon residents (including for places in other LA schools) and for places in Hillingdon schools (including from residents in neighbouring LAs.) This was against the overall London Trend, as 23 of 32 London LAs had a decline in applications.
- 2. Despite a record number of 3,659 secondary school applications, 94 per cent were offered one of their preferred places a higher proportion than last year and 71 per cent of Hillingdon pupils received their first choice an increase of 4 per cent when compared with 2021 admissions. This was also higher than the London average of 69.95 per cent. 89 per cent of applicants received one of their top three preference schools, an increase of 3 per cent on last year.
- 3. On National Offer Day 14 of the 18 secondary schools were full, including with 150 extra bulge places. More may fill as there are currently 120 late applicants being placed. Hillingdon admissions team process all Hillingdon residents applications and those from residents of other LAs applying for a place in Hillingdon. LAs share data as part of the Pan-London Admissions process.

On National Offer Day, 1 March 2022:

- 3,694 pupils had offers to Hillingdon Schools including 105 with EHCPs.
- A further 121 offers were made to those who had applied late, total to 3,815.
- 3,943 offers were made to Hillingdon residents to schools in and out of the borough.
- There is a net 'export' of 130 Hillingdon pupils to other LAs.
- We expect growth of 3% during the schools year from movements in.

- 1. A few individual pupil adjustments are continuing.
- 2 # Guru Nanak is an all-through school. These numbers include the 60 on roll in Year 6 who have a Year 7 Place without applying for it.
- 3. Only 5 schools had spaces after the computer matching ended, and 233 pupils were left with no match to their preferences, more than in previous years. They were made offers to place available that was closest.
- 4. Some parents are now declining their NOD offers, so there will be movement of pupils around schools and other LAs for some months, but with restricted options in Hillingdon and other LAs. This could lead to rise in EHE, as in past years.
- 5. Already, 14 schools have waiting lists (of up to 200 pupils) based on preferences that were not met on NOD, including pupils from other LAs. Each school prioritises pupils by their own admissions criteria and any places freed up are offered to the top of their list. Pupils can join more than one list. Late applicants can join waiting lists, and will be prioritised by the same criteria.
 - 4. Most Hillingdon school pupils live within two miles of their school, but some choose to travel for faith or other reasons to schools including to other LAs. There is more movement around the schools in the north than in the south, partly as half the schools are close to the borough boundary.
 - 5. The movements in and out of pupil 'home areas' are greatest in the north of the borough -18% of Year 7 starters in September 2022 in the north are pupils from other LAs, and 20% of Year 7 residents living in the north are going to schools out of the borough.

6. These proportions roughly reflect the overall secondary total rolls in all year groups, though there are greater variations between individual schools. Imports and exports vary annually, reflecting the relative popularity of schools in and outside Hillingdon. The numbers and margins of change then impacts on other schools and adds to the creation of pockets of empty places or pressure for

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more school places – and to the need to have a margin of places for the whole year reflecting new housing and movers in and the difficulty in predicting success in applying to faith and selective schools.

- 7. The total roll, all years in all Hillingdon secondary schools in October 2021 showed:
 - 90% of pupils in schools in the south live in the south.
 - Only 52% of pupils in schools in the north live in the north individual schools serve different catchments with 25% of pupils from the south and 23% from other LAs - due to schools' location close to borough boundaries and the only footbridge over the A40. The impacts include limiting places available for those living in the centre of the north and a higher proportion of pupils in the north than the south seeking and taking places in schools outside the LA.
 - 69% of pupils who live outside of Hillingdon come into a school in the north.
 - The proposed new free school, Bishop Arden, is needed to ensure all residents living in the north secure a school place and to help all residents do given the fluctuations from year to year in demand for individual schools and overall.
- 8. The table below on Residents and total pupils in and out of the 6 neighbouring LAs and beyond, highlights there are constant shifts between years. More pupils from Hillingdon gained places in Slough and Hertfordshire schools than in 2022 despite warnings it could be fewer. This shows nobody can predict the exact outcome of all the different pupil movements, reinforcing the need for a margin of spaces to cope with demand.

Special Education Needs

As reported last quarter, to meet the growing demand for special school places, a programme of capital works to expand and create new special schools and units in the Borough is being progressed, now linked to the DSG Safety Valve

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Recovery Programme being agreed with the DfE and a new capital bid.

10. The DSG Recovery Programme is a key strategic priority for the Local Authority. It will be underpinned by sufficient resource and capability to ensure timely and successful delivery.

The purpose of the Recovery Programme is:

- •To reduce the in-year deficit in 2021/22 as far as possible.
- •To eliminate the in-year deficit completely by 2024/25, and no later than 2025/26.
- •To put mainstream inclusion and high quality SEND services at the heart of education in Hillingdon.
- 11. This will improve mainstream inclusion, reduce total costs of special placements, add more specialist places in the borough and embed financial sustainability.
 - The delivery of this Programme must be achieved without compromising the ability of the Local Authority to deliver its statutory responsibilities to children and young people.
- 12. It will be enabled by a strategy which emphasises:
 - •Robust and direct links between project activities and realistic benefits.
 - •Improved understanding and analysis of data to guide towards specific challenges and issues.
 - •A multidisciplinary team and approach which takes collective responsibility for delivering the programme objectives.
 - •Clear, purposeful, and progressive management of stakeholders.
- 13. Importantly, there remains high-level oversight and collaboration from senior leaders within Hillingdon in the shaping and development of the programme. Lead officers from the Education Directorate have been aligned with the progression of the Programme and are committed to its objectives as well as holding accountability for projects within the programme. Additional resource has also been approved to support delivery around key capabilities. Rigorous programme management and a clear governance structure will be integral to the fulfilment of the programme with clearly defined roles and responsibilities.

Bid for more capital for more SEN places

14. Extra specialist places are needed in Hillingdon to meet the rising demand and gaps in need and to minimise use of independent provision and long travel for residents. The aim is to secure more places within the next few years and maximise the use of local education spaces. Following discussion with schools and trusts, new projects were selected that can be delivered in partnership with schools and academies that have significant surplus places and also commitment to inclusion and expertise in managing change. The primary schools have agreed in principle and further discussions on details are underway.
